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

On the 13th November 1916 the Elmhurst Bush Nursing Centre became the eighteenth Bush Nursing Centre to be established by the Victorian Bush Nursing Association. In 2021 Elmhurst Bush Nursing Centre will celebrate one hundred and five years of continuous service to the community and remains one of only fifteen Centres remaining as a bush nursing Centre in Victoria; many of the original Centres having been either converted into hospitals or closed.

The Centre is located at Elmhurst which is nestled at the foot of the Pyrenees Ranges in the south-west of Victoria; a farming community that predominantly specialises in wool, sheep, cattle and viticulture. It now services a rural community of approximately 1,200 people who live in or around the townships of Warrak, Amphitheatre, Landsborough and Crowlands.

Elmhurst Bush Nursing Centre delivers a community based health service which provides a broad range of healthcare services to these Communities. The Centre is financed by the Department of Health and by or Annual Membership.









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Elmhurst Bush Nursing Centre respectfully acknowledges the Djab Wurrong people as the traditional owners of this land, on which we work and live and recognize the continuing connection to land, water and community.














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Our Centre is one of just 15 Bush Nursing Centre's across Victoria.

Covid-19 restrictions

I certainly do not wish to dwell on the restrictive demands that have been levied at our Centre and individuals, but it is prudent that the dedication and professional experience of our staff be recognized.

Centre Kerry Manager Cattanach's coordination ensured that sufficient staff were rostered to meet monitor demands. and to anyone who would normally work in multiple nursing environments.

It was pleasing to see that people visiting the Centre were wearing the appropriate masks, sanitized hands and happy to have their temperatures recorded. The outcome is that to date we have remained virus free.

Funding Opportunities

For maintaining the successful operation of our Centre any opportunity to gain additional funding to enable new programs, purchase of vital clinical equipment or extra facilities has been sought by our Business Manager Mandy Preston.

An application submitted to RHIFS4 funding successful, allowing us to be a COVID19 safe facility through an automatic door and other security upgrades. We were successful in RHIFS5 funding this year and look forward to the construction of an outdoor paved and covered area at the rear of the Activities Room. Raised garden beds, seating, barbecue area, rainwater tank and new fencing will provide an environment where groups gather in relaxed, spacious and informal way, providing more COVID friendly facilities.

Bendigo Community Bank – Avoca & St. Arnaud

Part of the Bendigo Community Bank's charter is to financially support community groups.

Over the last couple of years all the Centre's banking requirements have been transferred to Bendigo Community Bank.

The opportunity was taken to apply for a Community Grant towards the purchase of a new vehicle suitable for staff to use as Remote Area Nursing in support of Ambulance Victoria.

The contribution to the Centre was \$12,500.00. The RAN car has been fitted out with radio communication and equipment as a first-responder car when a "000" call has been made for support in our catchment area.

Bendigo Community Bank are to be applauded for their support in this vital aspect of our service to people in need.

Appropriately, the Board has approved vehicle signage that reflects the joint business venture between Bendigo Community Bank and our Bush Nursing Centre.

Community Consultative Committee

This Committee is comprised of nominated members from the areas serviced by the Centre. We have representatives from Landsborough, Crowlands, Warrak, Amphitheatre and Elmhurst.

Recommendations that are later discussed at Board level include anything from Centre signage, provision of facilities, review promotional material and through to fundraising suggestions.

Volunteers

Just like almost every organisation

we too rely on volunteers who generously give of their time to assist in the operations of our Centre.

Currently we have ten volunteer drivers who are prepared to take clients to appointments in Ararat. Avoca, Stawell and Ballarat. This is seen as a vital link in the provision of patient services. Collated data indicates а significant increase in the number of bookings for this service.

Likewise, we have many others who readily assist in the kitchen with Kathie Vines, our Social Support Group coordinator, as they prepare meals that are then available to support those are less able who to undertake meal preparation for themselves. The meals have been particularly appreciated during periods of COVD restrictions.

The Board

Always seeking competent and experienced people to join the Board of Management, during this past year Mrs Jacy Keith was welcomed.

Many years ago, Jacy was a nurse at our Centre and has now offered her services to the Board. Because of Covid restrictions all Board members have been offered face-to-face attendance at meetings or to join in via zoom technology.

This process has permitted the continuance of regular Board meetings, in a personal safe environment.

The diligent and co-operative manner of all members has allowed for progressive and worthwhile deliberation of a vast array of matters.

Board members, all serving in a voluntary capacity, are well-aware of the immense responsibility that they hold on behalf of all members of the Centre and the wider community that we commissioned to serve.

In an ever-changing environment, important ongoing governance training was offered throughout the year to keep members abreast of legal requirements and corporate strategies.



The healthy financial status of the Centre can be mainly attributed to the oversight of treasurer Graeme Ferguson and Business Manager Mandy Preston. We rely on them to present the Board with detailed balance sheets that reflect the current financial status and the monitoring of budget goals.

The ongoing support of the financial membership ensures the significance of the medical services that are provided.

Over the past year memberships for single, couples and family groups have risen to 435.

The Centre regularly receives telephone calls, letters and cards that convey grateful appreciation for acts of professionalism or just a general welfare enquiry. These comments offer clarity that we must be offering a great service – but we do acknowledge that progress should always be our focus.

For the opportunity to serve the residents of our district all Board members are challenged to ensure the Centre's mission statement is more than words on paper. I offer my grateful appreciation for the support I have been afforded by the Board of Management, Centre staff and the community.



We sincerely thank all the members of our Community Consultative Committee for making themselves available to support our Centre and very much look forward to their input during 2022.







2020 / 2021 the years that

July 2020 sees the border between New South Wales and Victoria closed for the first time since the 1918-19 Spanish flu pandemic, after an increase in COVID19 cases in Melbourne; Melbourne City enter stage three restrictions and facemasks become mandatory there also.

August 2020 - Victoria is declared a state of disaster and stage four restrictions are put in place. Victoria records its highest daily total to date of new cases - 725.

September 2020 - The Australian economy goes into recession for the first time in nearly thirty years.

December 2020 - The 2020 Sydney to Hobart yacht race is cancelled for the first time in its history due to COVID19.

December 2020 Elmhurst Primary School closes it's doors for the last time after 152 years of providing education to the Elmhurst Community. The closing was marked with a final ringing of the bell with students past and present in attendance.









January 2021 the words of Australian national anthem "Advance Australia Fair" are changed to "for we are one and free".

February 2021 142,000 doses of Pfizer-BioNTech COVID19 vaccine arrive in Australia, first doses are administered by end of this month.

2020 / 2021 at EBNC we.....

- Provided delicious home cooked meals to the more vulnerable members of our Community. Social Support Group Co-ordinator Kathie Vines provided meals on a fortnightly basis to some very fortunate members of our Community.
- Provided transportation to those in the Community that would normally take public transport, to help decrease the risk of exposure to the COVID-19 virus,
- Provided support for members of the Community to complete the process of ordering groceries online.
- Modified the entrance to the Centre to contactless / self opening sliding door to reduce contamination risk at the Centre.
- Provided deliveries of food, pharmacy and all essential items to our Community.
 EBNC were able to ensure that our Community had access to everything needed on a weekly basis.
- Provided telephone support for the vulnerable / isolated members of the Community.
- Provided support and guidance for COVID19.
- Provided the venue for East Grampians Health Services to vaccinate our Community members with our assistance.

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Presentation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (Victoria). The Board of Management has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

b) Income Tax

The Association has a tax exempt status.

c) Property, plant and equipment

Office Equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by members of the Board of Management to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of these assets.

The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows which will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

Land and Buildings were re-valued last financial year during the year in line with the Capital Improved Value as indicated on the rates notice provided by Ararat Rural City.

The depreciation amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The average depreciation rate is 20% for office equipment.

d) Revenue

Revenue is accounted for on an accrual basis when it is earned.

 For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash includes cash on hand and in banks and term deposit investments.
